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The IQAC reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities.

The IQAC plays a dynamic role in guaranteeing operation of effective teaching-learning processes, steering student centric activities and recording the learning outcomes as per the systematic processes defined.

The periodic mechanism for reviewing the teaching learning and evaluation process involves:

- I. Review of Teaching-Learning process through
 - · Regular e-monitoring on ERP portal
 - · Departmental meetings
 - · Feedback systems for teaching- learning
 - Academic audits
- II. Review of Learning-Outcomes
 - CO and PO attainment
 - · Result analysis
- III. Post Accreditation-Initiatives
 - · Addition/Enrichment of new programmes/courses
 - · Strengthening of research activities

Above mechanisms are in place. Following two examples will illustrate IQAC's initiatives and systematic procedures set to ensure effective implementation of teaching-learning.

Mechanism 01: Feedback system

The college has a rigorous feedback mechanism for the effective implementation of curriculum enrichment. College opts following feedbacks which is being collected, analyzed and utilized for overall teaching learning process and development of the institution:

1. Feedback on curriculum by teachers

2. Feedback on curriculum by students

This feedback focuses on the level at which curriculum contributes to the students in providing basic knowledge comprehension with pharmacy profession, level of skill of critical analysis in decision making, critical thinking, level of abilities of selection, learning and using modern tools, understanding analysis and communicating the values of professional roles with respect to health safety and legal issues of society, level of skills in writing reports, making presentations, preparing documents etc.

3. Feedback on curriculum by employers

Employers are the major stakeholders to contribute for ushering the institute to achieve industrial standard by providing fruitful and meaningful feedback about the accomplishment of the curriculum. In this context institute has designed industry-oriented feedback form in order to seek the feedback of employers about the delivery of the curriculum and its relevance to industrial needs. The feedback sought from the employers is very vivid to prove that the content delivery of the curriculum.

4. Feedback on curriculum by alumni

Alumni of the college are major stakeholders to contribute for quality enhancement and sustenance. A feedback is collected from alumni to seek their inputs regarding the effective translation of the curriculum and subsequent transformation of graduates after the successful completion of program. Competencies expected out of the course, relevance of subjects in syllabus in relevance to the course, relevance of textbooks and reference books by their international recognition to the subjects, size of the syllabus in terms of the load on the student etc. are the parameters in the feedback.

5. Feedback on National Service Scheme by students

The contribution of youth service to nation building and mitigating societal needs for transforming demographic ethos, beliefs and superstitions for sustainability and peaceful life. Hence NSS unit of this college is actively working for the varied cause of the community by performing different activities. In this context a feedback form has been designed regarding the active participation of youth in community services. 6. Feedback on library by students

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<u>Mechanism 02: Attainment of Programme outcomes (POs) and course outcomes (COs)</u>


Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution. The course outcomes (COs) are prepared for each course (each subject) considering the curriculum given by the Pharmacy Council of India, Vision and Missionstatement, PEO's and program outcomes envisaged by NBA. The POs are assigned to Average course outcomes of each course (subject) in each year/semester. Each PO was given in the context of the course details as high (3), moderate (2) and low (1) attainmentlevels. Such course outcomes are made average for each PO. The POs are assigned for each course, and then each PO is averaged on the scale of 1 to 3 (slight to high) and taken to prepare CO-PO matrix of courses of all years of study. The assessment is based on the performance of the students in internal and external examinations, seminars, performance in practical, assignment co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

Sample of CO-PO attainment is given below. CO-PO attainment for all subjects is in place.










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The activities strongly institutionalized and showing incremental growth

Activity 01: Problem Solving Learning Initiatives

Poster/Oral Presentations, Publications, Journal Club Activity for PG Students are significant. Trainingsessions on sophisticated instruments are organized by the institute. MOU/Collaboration for research, Seminars, Webinars, FDP, STTP are attended by faculty and students. Guest lectures have been organized. Advance equipment purchases like HPLC (Shimadzu, quaternary) helped to enhance the quality of research of Ph. D. scholars and post graduate students. Awards for Innovation has been won by Institution/Teachers/Research scholars/Students. As a result, college has published significant patents on their research work. Thus, research activity is incremental.
